I've seen kids having their first bank accounts used by criminals to move their dodgy cash around. They call it being a money mule, you know those animals, like donkeys, that carry things?

I've seen the way they work, they ask you to look after some money, or find a reason to give you some.

Then they just transfer it over and you're part of their mess, caught in their web.

You don't know where that money's from or who's giving it to you. Don't be fooled, if someone just wants to put money in your account, it's probably come from criminal activity.

And what about 'Let's Play' videos', or 'Walkthroughs? Who's actually checking those 'Streamer' sites?

Some of the big games do monitor chat and restrict conversations to keep everyone safe. This makes sure that not anyone can post a comment, start a chat.

So, it's smart not to transfer over to conversations with people outside of your game on other apps without checking with an adult that it looks legit. Same goes for any gaming purchases – don't go to any third party sites as you don't know who you're dealing with.

Thing to remember with any chat is not to share any information or tell anyone who you are or where you live, what school you're at or even things like when you're going on holiday.

Get clued up. Do your research. Don't overshare.

Stay ahead of the game. Make a hot list of the bad guys, of malware, of dodgy sites. Spot the clues. Simple stuff, really. Be aware.

Play with people you know from the real world.

Finally, remember: what goes on online, can stay there for a really long time and be seen by lots of people.
